### **The Nuclear Crisis: Iraq, North Korea and Beyond**

GSI is seriously concerned, yet not surprised, about the increasing number of nuclear proliferators worldwide. For years, GSI's President Jonathan Granoff and fellow disarmament experts have been warning that unless the United States and the other nuclear weapon states take more decisive steps toward fulfilling their obligations under the Nuclear Non-proliferation Treaty (NPT) and eliminating nuclear weapons, other states are likely to view these devices as crucial for their own security. In an effort to stop the new nuclear arms race, which has been stimulated by President Bush's policy in support of the use, testing and modernization of US nuclear weapons, GSI works toward:

- moving US and NATO security policy away from promoting nuclear deterrence and military counter-proliferation;
- strengthening the NPT and other international treaties with effective international verification and monitoring mechanisms to prevent cheating; and
- designing a global security policy that generates security for all and does not rely on nuclear weapons.

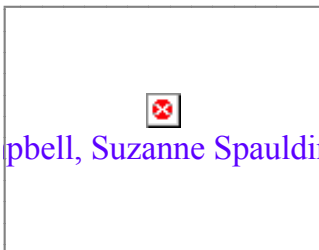

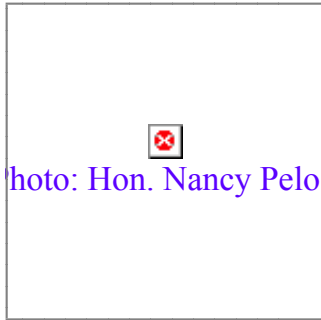
